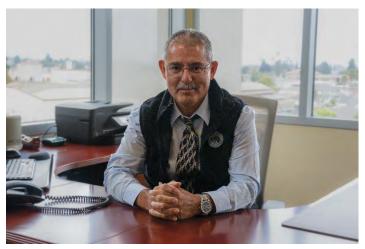
Jan Furman – Jan Furman began her teaching and coaching career in Davis, California where she founded and directed the Davis Volleyball Club for 10 years. She was inducted into the California Community College Volleyball Hall of Fame in 2004. Jan retired from full time teaching at Cabrillo in 2012 but continued as an adjunct faculty through 2014. She founded Main Beach Volleyball Club which is a non-profit organization that hires over 30 coaches, provides jobs for Cabrillo volleyball players, and serves over 200 girls, ages 10-18, in Santa Cruz County. She continues to be the organization's Executive Director. Jan volunteers for Jacob's Heart, supports and fundraises for farm workers in Watsonville and Pajaro and donates time to OrphanAid Africa, a non-profit, child-welfare organization that protects vulnerable children and young adults in Ghana. Jan holds a B.A from Chico State University in Kinesiology and Art, secondary teacher education and a M.A, from University of San Francisco in Athletic Administration Teaching.



Rick Li Fo Sjoe – Born in Suriname, South America and emigrated to the U.S. at the age of 10. Rick is a semi-retired Software Engineer doing IT/Consulting to business clients. His engineering skills were primarily in fault-tolerant Unix development.

Cabrillo College Foundation Board Member Responsibilities

- 1. Cabrillo College Foundation Directors are valuable contributors to the workings of the Board and the Foundation. Each is expected to become familiar with Foundation's goals, structure, and bylaws.
- 2. Directors are expected to attend four board meetings in September, November, February, and May. In general, meetings begin at 12:00 noon at the Sesnon House; lunch is served. All Directors are expected to pay for the cost of quarterly meeting luncheons. The cost is \$85 annually.
- 3. Directors participate on at least one of the following committees:

Audit Committee
Executive Committee
Finance and Investments Committee
Cabrillo Advancement Program (CAP) Committee
Faculty Grants Committee
Nominating Committee

President's Circle Committee
Retiree Committee
Scholarship Committee
Veterans Committee
Women's Educational Success Committee

- 4. Each Director is expected to personally contribute annually to the Foundation in an amount appropriate to the individual's financial circumstances. Directors are encouraged to join the President's Circle.
- 5. Because the purpose of the Foundation is to increase financial support to the college, Directors are expected to actively participate in raising funds through personal contributions, identification of donors, and solicitation of prospects. Staff assists with these activities.
- 6. Directors are encouraged to become members of the Heritage Club. The Heritage Club, a program of the Cabrillo College Foundation, honors those who have remembered Cabrillo College in their will or trust.
- 7. Directors are expected to communicate the Foundation's message to associates in the community.
- 8. Directors are expected to review minutes and related documents prior to each designated meeting.
- 9. Directors are advised to handle situations involving a conflict of interest with discretion and integrity.
- 10. Directors are expected to understand and follow Brown Act regulations.
- 11. Directors may serve a maximum of six years consisting of two three-year terms. Presidents may serve an additional year as Past President. Directors that are college representatives serve renewable three year terms.

Board nominates and approves all members. Community Directors serve two, three-year consecutive terms. Each Director's three-year term shall commence July 1 after elected at the May meeting and shall expire June 30 three years thereafter. Community Directors may serve a maximum of six years. *Past Presidents serve additional bonus year beyond regular term limit.

Eight (8) of the Directors shall be representatives of Cabrillo College, at least one (1) of whom shall be a full-time faculty member of Cabrillo College. The College's Superintendent/President, three (3) Vice Presidents, and three (3) College Trustees will be selected to serve on the Foundation Board.

Cabrillo College Representatives shall hold office for three (3) years, except in the event of an earlier termination of any such Director's status as a representative of the College. In that event, such a Director's term of office shall end at the same time as that Director ceases to be a College representative. There is no limit on the number of consecutive three-year terms a Director who is a representative of Cabrillo College may serve.

^{*}Prior to 7/1/22, initial appointments were a one-year term, followed by two consecutive three-year terms.

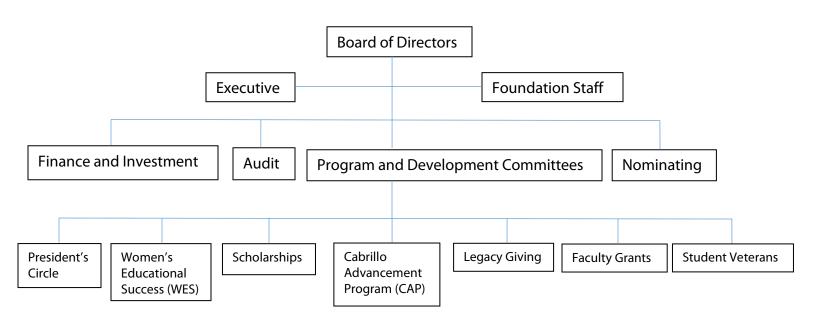


Cabrillo College Foundation Background and Mission

The Cabrillo College Foundation is a nonprofit organization established in 1962 to raise private donations for the support of Cabrillo programs. Private support is used for student scholarships, research and educational programs, faculty and departmental support, facilities, and equipment. Local citizens, college staff, faculty and Cabrillo trustees serve on the 30-member foundation board, representing all geographic areas of Santa Cruz County.

The Cabrillo College Foundation's mission is to operate for the advancement of education; to solicit and raise money for scholarships, facilities, equipment, research and education projects; to improve faculty teaching competence; to provide departmental support; and to otherwise provide aid supplementary to public tax dollars for the support and benefit of Cabrillo College.

Cabrillo College Foundation Brown Act and Public Participation at Meetings Policy

The Brown Act provides opportunities for members of the general public to observe and comment on the public business of the CCF that is conducted by the Board of CCF or its standing committees, as required by the Brown Act. The Board of Directors and the Executive, Finance, and Audit committees are considered Brown Act bodies.

Opportunity for public comment at meetings:

There will be opportunities at each regular meeting for the general public to comment on items on the agenda and items not on the agenda that are within the purview of the CCF. No action may be taken on non-agenda items.

Public comment at special meetings is limited to items on the agenda.

Unless otherwise determined by the Chair, a member of the public is limited to three minutes when addressing the CCF Board of Directors and committees which are Brown Act bodies.

General rules regarding meetings:

- A **regular meeting** must be noticed by an agenda posted at least 72 hours in advance of the meeting. The agenda must be publicly accessible 24 hours per day. Internet posting of the agenda is also required if the entity has a web site.
- A **special meeting** must be noticed by an agenda posted at least 24 hours in advance of the meeting. No items can be added to a special meeting agenda. Notice must be given to news organizations who have requested such notice.
- An **emergency meeting** must be specially noticed. Only "emergencies" as defined in the Brown Act are subject to this provision.

Closed sessions are permitted under a narrow set of circumstances. They must be noticed as a closed session on the agenda, and any final "action taken" must be reported out to the public. Closed sessions are permitted for:

- 1. Personnel matters (discipline, dismissal, evaluations, and other confidential employee matters)
- 2. Pending litigation (this includes actual litigation and threatened litigation)
- 3.Real estate negotiations
- 4. Labor negotiations (this includes salary negotiations)
- 5. Threat to public facilities or services
- Public records/writings distributed to board members less than 72 hours before a regular meeting must be made available to the public at the time of distribution to the board. Such public records will be available at the CCF office or other location described on the agenda.
- Brown Act bodies are prohibited from taking action on **items not appearing on the posted agenda**. There are, however, exceptions. For example, if the body, at a regular meeting, makes findings to add the item to the agenda: By a ²/₃ vote or, if less than ²/₃ of the body are present, by a unanimous vote, that action needs to be taken immediately and the need to take action occurred after posting the agenda for a regular meeting.

SUBJECT: Name change of Cabrillo College and impact to Foundation

Background

In November 2022, after a two-year analysis, the college Board of Trustees voted to change the school's name so that it will no longer be named after Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo — an explorer of the California coastline, whose expedition is considered to have cleared the way for the colonial conquest of California and the violent treatment of native people. During this period of research the Name Exploration Subcommittee shared information and invited our community of donors to participate in several public forums. The trustees have stated that funding for the name change will not come from the college's general fund or the Cabrillo Foundation. Instead, the school plans to seek money from outside sources.

In June 2023, the Name Selection Task Force put forward five potential (new) names for the college and held forums (both virtually and in person) to elicit feedback. The local papers received a large number of opinion letters against the name change and scant positive feedback regarding any of the suggested replacement names. The few letters supportive of the name change were outnumbered by the letters in opposition. In light of the public outcry, in August 2023, the college Trustees voted to defer the name change process until November 2023 and committed to explore ways to better engage the community. They cited potential loss of contributions to the Cabrillo Foundation as a factor in their decision, the lack of a scientific poll to gauge community reaction, limited representation of current and future students, costs associated with a name change, and potential negative impact on future bond issues.

Foundation Outreach

When the Trustees reached their name change decision on November 14, 2022, the foundation emailed our list of 4,164 supporters informing them of the decision and sharing the college's Press Release on the subject. We heard back from over 50 donors who expressed significant disappointment. Several donors stated that they would no longer support the college financially and a few reported that they were removing Cabrillo from their estate plans.

After the foundation's Holiday Party in December 2022, Eileen reached out to nearly 100 stakeholders to invite them to share their thoughts and heard from over 60 via email and phone. Although a minority are open to this change, the majority of our supporters are experiencing some level of loss and disappointment in relation to this decision. Eileen is continuing to reach out to donors to help process and reinforce the foundation's mission to help students.



In June of 2023 we emailed our 4,164 donor list announcing the five names under consideration, provided forum details and shared a the link to the name survey. At least 360 clicked on the link to take the survey as a result of this outreach.

Financial Impact

It remains difficult to predict the financial impact the name change will have on our fundraising. We can report, however, that we saw a 7% dip in our average retention rate for our President's Circle Campaign. New donors and donors giving more made up for the dip and we raised \$6,000 more than the prior year. We have been told that donors are considering not giving "in protest." We are aware that donors feel less connected to the college, which will likely impact giving. One donor has informed the foundation directly that she is removing CCF from her estate plans. We are proactively messaging to remind donors of our mission to support students and that the college will continue its life-changing work.

Eileen continues to initiate discussions with donors who are frustrated by this process and the potential name change. This is an ongoing topic of conversation with every person Eileen and the Foundation team interacts with. These conversations are time consuming and complicated and keeps staff from entertaining donor conversations that we wish to be more positive and more focused on our mission.

Next Steps

- Keep donors apprised of developments in the renaming process
- Continue to have conversations with donors and listen to their concerns, show our appreciation, and reiterate that the foundation's mission to help students is not wavering.
- If selected, the foundation will change its name to align with the college.
 - The foundation will keep its tax id number. We were advised this will take a long time and to submit paperwork promptly when the name has been selected.

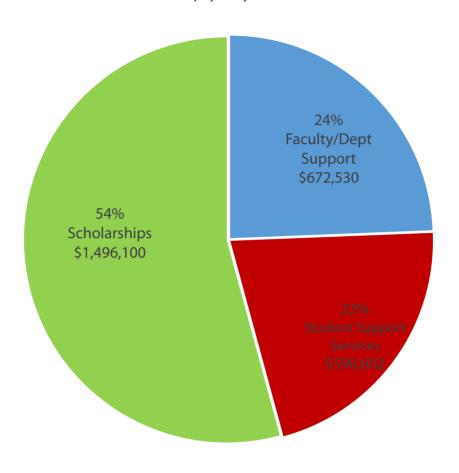

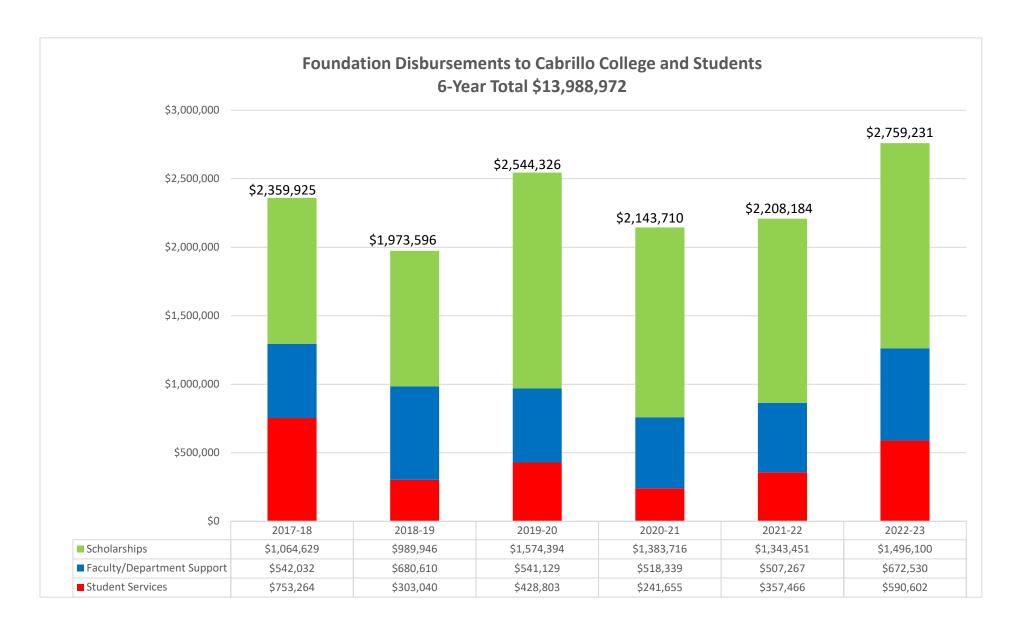


Disbursements to Cabrillo College and Students July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023 Total: \$2,759,231

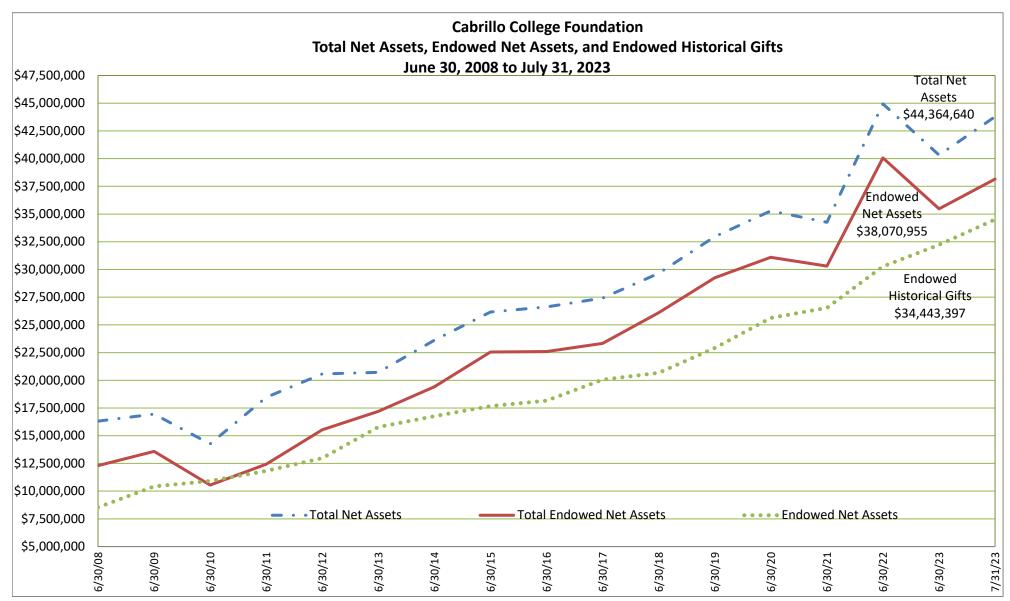

Special Presentation

Amy Lehman-Sexton gave an overview of the Guardian Scholars Program and introduced Guardian Scholars Program Coordinator, Keyiona Ritchey. Keyiona gave a history of the program and an overview of the program details. She introduced sisters Mary Alice and Mariah who are both in the Guardian Scholars program. <u>Cabrillo College President's Report</u>

The current allocation would allow for 8 projects to be funded, but it they \$250 million is deferred, only about 4 projects could be funded. We will know by late May or early June.

Matt introduced the Rising Scholars Program at Cabrillo that supports currently and formerly incarcerated students. Vice President of Student Services, Amy Lehman-Sexton gave an overview of the program.

Matt reported that the name change exploration committee has 23 members and has reviewed about 350 names and narrowed it down to 9 top choices. Total liabilities of \$2.3M are \$44K less than prior year.

Net Assets:

Total net assets of \$43.7M are \$2.8M more than prior year.

(2) Income Statement

• Revenue:

Total revenue is \$7.7M higher than prior year primarily due to investment earnings. Earned income as of June 30, 2023 is \$2.8M compared to the prior year balance of \$4.2M. Total contributed income of \$4.6M is \$668K higher than prior year.

• Expenses:

Total expenses of \$4.6M are \$253K over prior year. Program expenses and scholarships were \$267K more than prior year.

• Surplus/Deficit:

As of June 30, 2023, there is a \$2.8M surplus compared to prior year surplus of -\$4.6M.

(3) Operational Budget to Actual

• Revenue:

Operating revenue of \$1.4M is \$138K favorable vs budget due to the increases in investment income from the Short Term and Intermediate pools, fee income and contributions received.

Expenses:

Operating expenses of \$1.1M are \$92K favorable vs budget This is primarily due to lower salary expenses and payroll taxes and benefit savings.

• Surplus/Deficit:

The operating fund surplus is \$317,219 prior to audit. This is after allocating \$23,589 to fulfill the 2023/24 9 month operating reserve and allocating \$84,409 to fulfill 100% of the June 30, 2023 Retiree Medical Benefit Liability. As of June 30, 2023 we have \$891,246 in operating reserves and \$977,652 in Undesignated funds.

Executive Director

Last year the Executive Committee asked Executive Director, Eileen Hill to develop a 360 degree Executive Director performance evaluation process handled by a third party. Eileen worked with the Board President, Past President, and College President on the survey and a list of 63 people who work with Eileen. Survey recipients included Foundation Board Members, Foundation staff, Cabrillo employees, and donors/committee members. Cabrillo's Human Resources department managed the process and collected the anonymous responses. Foundation Board Members received Eileen's self-evaluation for additional background.

Cabrillo HR summarized responses (49 out of 63) for the Board Past President and College President to complete Eileen's annual performance evaluation. Patty Quillin (Past President) and Matt Wetstein (Cabrillo President) with input from Rachel Wedeen (Foundation President) produced the 2022-23 Executive Director Performance evaluation based on the survey results and self evaluation.

SUMMARY

The Executive Committee has completed the Executive Director performance evaluation and provided a positive evaluation and set up goals for the year.

Aligning with Cabrillo's evaluation process, the 360 degree Executive Director performance evaluation will be conducted every three years to reach a wider audience for feedback. The annual performance evaluation be sent to the Foundation Board for input.

Faculty and Staff Grants

Cabrillo College Foundation has three grant programs to support Cabrillo College faculty:

- 1. Faculty Grants for Student Success: \$103,067 available to award
- 2. Crocker Endowment Grants: \$24,067 available to award
 - Crocker Nursing Endowment Grants
 - Crocker Dental Hygiene Endowment Grants
 - Crocker VAPA Endowment Grants
 - Crocker Campus-Wide Endowment Grants
- 3. Engineering and Applied Science Endowment: \$8,976 available to award

Grant recipients are selected through an annual proposal process. In October and November of each year, various committees meet to evaluate proposals and select grant recipients for each of the three grant programs. The Faculty Grants for Student Success selection committee is comprised of Foundation Board Members, Cabrillo Faculty and community members, who all review proposals, then meet to determine which projects receive funding.

This year there is \$136,110 available to award Cabrillo staff and faculty to enhance student learning and increase success.

BACKGROUND

The Cabrillo Advancement Program (CAP) is a scholarship and support program designed to increase the academic success of high risk, low income students and to support their preparation for attending college. Students who complete CAP receive \$3,000 in scholarships upon high school graduation for their first and second year at Cabrillo.

CEREMONY

The CAP Ceremony was canceled in March due to the severe storms and flooding in Pajaro. The event was rescheduled to May 3rd and held at Lakeview Middle School, which began serving Pajaro Middle School students after the levee breech. We celebrated the 40 Pajaro Valley Unified School District 6th grade CAP students who were entering the CAP program. We're grateful to celebrate in a space that was comfortable and convenient for many of our newest students and their families; however, we look forward to hosting this event at Cabrillo in 2024.



ACTIVITIES

Summer 2023: 27 CAP girls attended the Baskin Girls in Engineering program. A small group of CAP students attended a Cyber Camp, hosted by the County Office of Education. Liz and her team also orchestrated the Summer Institute online curriculum. We look forward to holding an in-person Summer Institute next year.

SUBJECT: Student Veterans Endowment

Background

In 2020, Cabrillo College student veterans launched the first annual Student Veterans Endowment (SVE) campaign. The Student Veterans Endowment provides rapid response grants to student veterans who experience unforeseen hardships while transitioning to civilian life. SVE grants are awarded within one week of the request and fortify students who are experiencing challenges.

Last year \$42,456 was raised for the Student Veterans Endowment (\$26,858 wasraised the previous year). The Student Veterans Endowment has grown to \$86,073. Nine rapid response grants have been awarded in the amount of \$500 each to help our students veterans stay on their path. A total of \$2,000 will be available to award for the 2023-24 academic year.

Cabrillo student and veteran, Mark Hinojosa and Cabrillo staff member and veteran, Linda Mejia are serving as co-chairs of the 2023 Quick Reaction Force Committee. They are working to recruit committee members to the Quick Reaction Force to help raise funds for this year's 2023 Student Veterans Endowment campaign. Veteran Mike Brandy has pledged to match gifts of \$100 or more, up to \$5,000. Donors and veterans will be honored at the annual Cabrillo Veterans BBQ on November 9thth.
